THE SEVENTEENTH SUNDAY IN SUMMER'S ORDINARY TIME

From Father Robert

Let's let a miracle be a miracle! Jesus tested Philip, who failed the test because he fixated on calculating the amount of food needed to feed the hungry crowd and its cost. He couldn't even imagine another way. Jesus, however, "knew what He was doing to do" – He gave the crowd "as much as they wanted." Amazingly, the miracle of giving them "as much as they wanted" was still less than the other miracle Jesus gave them: "the sign" of the fullness of messianic life. So much Life – even "twelve wicker baskets" more than they wanted. Calculate that!

The abundance in this multiplication account points to an eschatological sign of risen Life. The multiplication of the loaves points to a time of fulfillment when God's plan for redemption is finally realized. Even the context of today's gospel passage points to a time of fulfillment: it is Passover – Israel's annual celebration of God's mighty deeds on their behalf. The wondrous and impressive sign that Jesus works on this occasion - feeding five thousand with five loaves – points to a time when God's mighty deeds come to fulfillment – a time when all people are abundantly filled and every need is met.

The question about having food to feed the crowd is put to two particular apostles (Philip and Andrew) who traditionally are considered to be ministers to the Gentiles ("Jesus went across the Sea of Galilee" = to Gentile territory); in the messianic reign even the Gentiles will share in the abundance and be saved. This bread is specified as barley, the grain used by the poor; in the messianic reign the poor will also share in God's abundance. Twelve baskets of bread fragments were gathered up after all had their fill; the leftovers and the number twelve point to the new Israel in its eschatological perfection.

Jesus' unprecedented miracle of abundance doesn't warrant His being made an earthly king, in spite of the crowd's understandable enthusiasm; rather, "he withdrew...alone" so that the miracle of abundance points to the establishment of a new kingdom, a new Israel. Jesus supersedes both the apostles' and the crowd's expectations of God's reign: with little He feeds many and thus reveals that He is not an earthly king, but, ironically, Jesus is a king. Jesus Himself is an eschatological sign of abundance – of God's lavish Presence.

Living The Paschal Mystery

Today's gospel account is far more than an interesting story about a miracle and abundance; it primes us to reflect on the great mystery of Jesus Himself as the Bread of Life (which we will hear about on the next five Sundays) and His selfgiving that enables us to share in it. The challenge for us is far more than believing in Jesus' power to multiply loaves and fishes; the challenge is recognizing Jesus' self-giving as a sign of fulfillment and promise of eschatological glory that we shares even now. We Christians are to see our lives through the lens of God's lavish abundance. Do we?

It is too easy to think of God's lavish abundance primarily (maybe exclusively?) in terms of the Eucharist we share each Sunday. Truly, this is a mighty act of God on our behalf, and Eucharist is always an eschatological sign of God's abundance and a time of future fulfillment. However, we ought not to let this lull us into missing other sings of God's abundance: the abundance of family and friends, steady job, support and care for others. God's abundance is all around us! Calculate that!

As we begin with today's liturgies a six week reflection on the "Bread of Life" discourse, what thoughts and feelings are you experiencing?

- God has given me "as much...as

About Liturgy: John 6 – The Bread of Life Discourse

John's gospel is read extensively during the festal seasons, but there is no block of Sundays during these high celebration times when the beautiful Bread of life Discourse from John's sixth chapter could be included without breaking it up. Those who compiled the Lectionary made the decision to include extensive portions of this sixth chapter from John's gospel on five consecutive Sundays during Year B as a theological commentary on the multiplication of the loaves and, by extension, on the Eucharist. It is inserted in Mark's gospel

just at the point of Mark's multiplication account (which is omitted in order to proclaim the multiplication account from John's gospel).

This decision reminds us that the Lectionary is not a Bible, but is a liturgical book with is own purpose. Since the Lectionary is a liturgical book used primarily during the celebration of Eucharist, it should come as no surprise to us that the intent is precisely to draw our attention to the Mystery of the Eucharist.

In reflection on the gospel we mentioned a number of indicators in the text that the passage is eschatological, that is, refers to the final fulfillment at the end times. The gospel for this Sunday also includes indicators that the passage is Eucharistic. For example, Jesus gives thanks; the Greek term used here is *eucharistesas*. the word from which we derive our term Eucharist. Moreover, unlike the account in Mark, in the Johannine account Jesus Himself distributes the bread to the hungry crowd, pointing to Himself as the Bread of Life. Finally, the Passover and eschatological contexts remind us that Eucharist is a sacrament related to the end times and our share in Christ's risen life.

About Liturgical Music: Singing The Communion Music, Part I

The proclamation of Jesus' Bread of Life discourse we begin today offers us a good opportunity to reflect on the purpose of the Music for the Communion Procession. According to the General Instruction to the Roman Missal (GIRM), No. 86, the Music for the Communion Procession has three purposes: (1) to express the communicants' unity by means of the

unity of their voices, (2) to express "gladness of heart," and (3) to make the communal nature of the Communion Procession more evident. This week we reflect on the first purpose.

The GIRM indicates the Music for the Communion Procession is an outward expression of our inward unity in Christ. This means the music is itself sacramental. It both celebrates our communion and assists it to happen. It is never to be lightly omitted, either by the liturgy planners or by an individual member of the assembly who chooses not to sing. For music planners, this means choosing music the assembly is able to sing easily and well. For us as members of the assembly, this means choosing to enter into the communal singing even when the music is a little unfamiliar to us, or perhaps not to our liking. It means adding our singular voice, no matter what we think about its quality, to the communal voice of the assembly. It means entering into the Communion Procession with full hearts, and letting the singing transform any sense of private prayer into the shared prayer of the Body of Christ.
