Justice Corner

Last week you received information on *Amoris Laetitia*, Pope Francis' Apostolic Exhortation on *The Joy of Love*. Since the foundation and understanding of justice begins in the family, there are a few more thoughts worth rendering here before we go on the other things.

Chapter Four talks about love in marriage and uses 1 Cor.13 as an ideal to be strived for. We all know these famous words, "love is patient, love is kind..." The ideal of marriage and all relationships is contained therein. But, I particularly liked sections 163 and 164 which addresses marriage in our ever growing life span. As we grow older, some have the opportunity to live into the fourth, fifth and sixth decade of being together. It speaks of the "pleasure of mutual belonging and the knowledge that neither person is alone, but has a partner with whom everything is shared. He or she is a companion on life's journey, one with whom to face life's difficulties and enjoy its pleasures." In the struggle and disagreements that happen between two people, we often forget that we live in a very complex age, one where it is difficult to approach life's conclusion without a helping hand. A small squabble may not be reason enough to let go of a friendship that we need to deal with the hardships and complexity of the current age. We should, "stop demanding of interpersonal relationships a purity of intention and a consistency which we will only encounter in the Kingdom to come." (325) Such a faithful and understanding relationship is "Much more than two" (Poet Mario Benedetti quoted on p. 128).

One of the most important concepts which Pope Francis proposes is a way of thinking about "irregular situations" with tenderness and mercy. He does not give us rules, but asks that pastors be particularly sensitive to each couples situation. In considering a pastoral approach towards people who have contracted a civil marriage, who are divorced and remarried, or simply living together, "the Church has the responsibility of helping them understand the divine pedagogy of grace in their lives and offering them assistance so they can reach the fullness of Gods plan for them." (297)

In Chapter Six the Pope speaks for the parish as "a family of families" and asks for pastoral outreach that takes this into account. He asks for the adequate formation of all ministers who deal with families. He states that we need to help young people "perceived the attraction of complete union that elevates and perfects the social dimension of existence, gives sexuality its deepest meaning and benefits children by offering them the best context for their growth and development." (205) He asks for marriage preparation that helps young people make a solid beginning of life as a family.

"Married life is a process of growth, in which each spouse is God's means of helping the other to mature. Change, improvement, the flowering of good qualities present in each person-all these are possible. Each marriage is a kind of salvation history, which from fragile beginnings-thanks to God's gift and a creative and generous response on our part-grows over time into something precious and enduring...Love makes each wait for the other with patience of a craftsman, patience which comes from God." (221) We are grateful to Pope Francis for his tender and merciful consideration of the struggles that couples face today and a pastoral sense of love and forgiveness of the weaknesses that exist in families today.


Shades of an Artist's Palate

The parish is starting to acclimate to the change of season. Our new green Summer's Ordinary Time panels hanging in the church will change once again. The plan is for the inner fabric to take the place of the outer fabric and vice-versa. There are always different ways of looking at the interior environment of the church. The Environment Committee is always looking for ways to make coming to church something new to experience. Basic colors are used depending on the season, like green for Ordinary Time; and special days, such as red for Pentecost. The shades of the basic colors can change from year-to-year or even change several times within a season. Accent colors increase the possibilities of having a new environment that the congregation has not seen. We at St. Ignatius of Antioch stand above most Churches when it comes to having decorative or festive environments that are designed and aimed at increasing participation and understanding of the liturgies.

Our newly installed icons are another example of building an environment that helps keep our minds and hearts focused on what it means to be a follower of Jesus and what the cost of doing so might be. I very much like our new icons and for me, my mind must be more attuned for color balance than gender balance. At first I couldn't understand why the colors of the backgrounds of the icons weren't arranged in the same manner for each wall. Each set of three icons contains one icon with a reddish-yellow background and the other two with lighter and darker greenish-blue backgrounds. Why weren't they balanced, let's say...the reddish-yellow icon in the middle flanked by the darker other two? It took a while for me to realize that it was balanced in a girl-boy-girl arrangement; the two boys in the middle and the girls abreast of them (no pun intended). It's funny how the mind seeks balance, order, and reason for the way things are. The artist in me sought a balance of color. A geneticist or social justice worker may not have had the question "what's unbalanced?" even come to mind.

The point is, are our <u>hearts</u> seeking the balance that Jesus wants us to have? Can we approach life and its difficulties with an aim to balance or reconcile ourselves to those around us, particularly the stranger, with the way they see things as being either balanced (just) or unbalanced (unjust)? When and if we can do that with our lives...then perhaps one day someone may paint an icon with our image.
