#### Justice Corner

Thanks to an article by Sr. Patricia Bruno who has given retreats at our parish, I was reminded of the Book of Lamentations which is interwoven with the daily prayers of the Triduum. These five chapters of the Bible are filled with the experience of Israel under foreign rule. In 586, Israel was conquered and led into slavery by Nebuchadnezzar's Babylonian empire. Their world fell apart. The Temple was destroyed. There was no longer a center of worship. The rules changed. The world they knew was forever changed. The verses are filled with sadness, weeping and mourning. The adjectives used for this event are familiar to anyone who has experienced loss: lonely, deserted, in bitter grief, groaning, cast away, sick at heart, unable to rise, etc. The people feel they are no longer are "in charge" of their own lives.

I also recently saw the movie, "The Darkest Hour" where Winston Churchill in May of 1940 argued against trying to make peace with Hitler who wanted to conquer all of Europe including Britain. The most powerful scene for me was when he boards a subway (the Underground) and asks the people what they want. Do they want to exist under Hitler? They respond, "Never, Never!" It was not until December of 1941 that the United States joined the effort to defeat Hitler and returned the countries of Europe to their rightful states. But Europe and the United States were never the same. Millions lost their lives and known buildings, artworks and landmarks disappeared. The rules changed and globalization and marketing capitalism became a way of life.

We are currently in an era of global change. We have not been without war since then. Korea, Vietnam, Cambodia, Laos, and now Afghanistan, Iraq, Syria, Lebanon, Israel and Palestine and others have felt the destructive weapons manufactured by the powers that defeated Hitler and went on to try to control countries with the resources that we coveted. Is it any wonder that our children now try to imitate the desire to control and the lack of respect for life. How many shootings on school grounds and other public places have to take place in order for us to realize we are on the wrong track. Who wants to live in a world with no respect for life or compassion for the struggles of others? What is our response as Catholic Christians?

My suggestion is to read the five chapters of the Book of Lamentations during the rest of Lent. Let us weep and mourn with those whose countries have been forever destroyed and whose lives are forever broken. Let us feel the affliction of refugees fleeing the destruction of all they know. Let us acknowledge our complicity with the war advocates and gun promoters. This is not about the second amendment. This is about saying "never" to those who want to conquer others for their own gain. This is about taking on the mantle of the Gospel that tells us to love our neighbor and be people of peace. This is about willingly standing up to the Pharisaical hypocrites and the Roman governors in our lives and willingly going to Calvary for the sake of the world, that the world may know a God who loves us and is with us in our suffering, a God who promises resurrection. "Restore us to Yourself, O God, that we may be restored," says verse 5:21. This is about walking with those who the world despises and making our lives stand for something. It is not a popular stance. It takes courage to continue to say "never" to those who would promise us riches and power in exchange for our Gospel values. "Success is not final and failure is not fatal. It is the courage to continue that counts." (Winston Churchill)

## Parish Perspective

Matthew Kelly Meets Indiana Jones

For those who have been participating in the parish's Lenten exercise (which is the online Matthew Kelly program *The Best Lent Ever*) you know the theme of many of the exercises is to become the best version of yourself. Matthew guides us through awareness and simple acts to improve our virtues, prayer life, and making the next right decision moment by moment.

By necessity, programs like these require us to take a look back and see if we have changed for the better. There is no better time than now, especially in the middle of Lent, to take a look back. One of the first three-part exercises was to "read the gospels" as a daily Lenten devotion. I decided to not give-up chocolate but to read the gospels instead. To make it interesting and a bit fun I dug-out an old Catholic Douay-Rheims version I had been given long ago and started to read the gospel of Matthew.

At first the reading was slow due to the Old English words like thou, withersoever, wilt, owest, and goeth. I almost switched bibles but something within me said "that would be cheating" so I stuck to it. Soon I was reading at full speed and came to appreciate the different flavor that the prose offered. Though the meaning of the scriptures were not changed there is a sense of newness to them. There are delightfully enlightening ways of seeing the gospel in a new light through an older translation. To explain what it is like, let me give you an example. The modern text may give us a perspective of looking over Peter's shoulder as Jesus asks him "Who do you say that I am?" The old text may give us a sense of looking over Jesus' shoulder at Peter as he speaks the same words. Their relative positions don't change, and the meaning of the words don't change. It's just a different experience of the same gospel.

On the fun side, it's like being Indiana Jones and discovering something new in an "ancient text" that leads to the treasure of the gospel. Our Sunday Liturgy experience of the gospel far too often will leave-out "non-relevant" passages, e.g. Luke15: 1-3, 11-32. So, what happened in passages 4-10? Missed passages can change the flavor, mood, setting, emotion, and even the context of the reading.

Reading the entire gospel is a very good way to get to the core of who we are as Catholic Christians and followers of Jesus. I recommend it as a Lenten devotion and as a discipline to be continued after Lent ends. Matthew Kelly and Indiana Jones side-by-side for Lent? Who would have known?


#### MENTAL HEALTH FIRST AID


