

Justice Corner

The prayer for Pentecost says, "Pour out, we pray, the gifts of the Holy Spirit, across the face of the earth." Certainly we need the Spirit's wisdom and counsel in these days of conflict and war around the world. The coming of the Spirit is expressed in the Acts as tongues of fire and a "strong driving wind." In California, we are accustomed to strong windy days, so we know the unsettled feeling of a heavy wind. Many of us have fire places in our homes and we know both the feel of peace that comes from sitting before a hearth fire, and the dangers of wild fires that can wipe out neighborhoods in a short period of time.

The coming of the Spirit is as unpredictable as this. It can be sudden or gentle, peaceful or frightening, but surely it indicates change. We know that being faithful to the promptings of the Spirit can bring change in our lives and in the lives of others. Often this change is hard and unexpected, but leads to new and amazing places.

Think of the times in your life when the unexpected happened, when you found yourself saying, "I didn't expect that!" When this happens we often have to take stock of where we are and what we believe about God. It changes our awareness. We have the opportunity to grow out of old patterns and come to a new place. There is a kind of surprise factor in the coming of the Spirit. We thought we knew how life should be and then suddenly it changes. We have learned through the past few weeks in reading from the Acts of the Apostles that Peter and Paul had to change their world view from a Jewish one to a global one. What part of your world view is the Spirit working on?

In these moments, we have an opportunity, if we choose to take it. We can stubbornly fall back into the familiar or we can open our hearts and say, "OK, God show me the new path You wish me to follow." The latter means that we have the courage to start again, to see new ways of doing things, new viewpoints. Thomas Merton said, "When we fall into Primal Love, we realize that everything is OK." Letting the Spirit work in us is letting Love rule and knowing that "All will be well."

Remember the gifts of the Spirit: Wisdom, Understanding, Counsel, Fortitude, Knowledge, Piety and Fear (awe) of the Lord? Oh, that we had leaders that would exhibit these gifts in dealing with decisions that affect the countries and peoples of the world! Well, it starts right here with us. If you are a parent, ask for these gifts in dealing with your family. Ask for these gifts in your organizations. Ask for these gifts when there are squabbles and misunderstandings. If you are a young person, ask that the Spirit guide your life decisions. Pray for these gifts when things seem dark and unexpected. The Spirit is in the Wind and Fire. The gifts of the Spirit are strong and passionate. We know that Christ is among us because we see the inspiration of the Spirit at work in our prayer life, in our relationships, in our neighborhoods and in our parish. May we be on fire with God's love and act according to the Spirit's gifts. It starts right here in Antioch!

Babes in the Woods

It was a warm summer-like evening in Pittsburg at the Winter Nights Shelter. As I walked from my car to the hall the sun was still shining and overtly the title of the shelter stood in contrast to the weather conditions that suggested no shelter was needed by anyone. Inside the hall was a different story.

Here, shelter was needed on several different levels. About five different families were gathered together within the hall where dinner was about to be served. Children of various ages and ethnic backgrounds wandered and played together. Adults also roamed within the confines of the great hall and kept track and peace among the young ones.

At one end of the hall was the kitchen where volunteers from our Knights of Columbus had just finished retrieving a half dozen aluminum pans of bubbling hot lasagna from the oven. Another volunteer was administering the last final tosses to the Caesar salad. Crispy garlic bread was cut and contained in a large serving bowl. The volunteers were Dave Simpson, our Grand Knight, Bob P., Clem B., Walter S., Don B., and arriving late yours truly. Three of us, Bob, Walter and I were first timers and followed the competent lead of our brother knights. The serving was the easy part. Making the people feel comfortable and free to have as much food as they wanted took just a little more loving effort.

Addressing and speaking to them as if we were longtime friends helped them to ask for a little bit more of salad, lasagna, or whatever it was they wanted. I know it helped me to associate with them on a more down-to-earth personal level. When I asked one fellow if there was anything else I could get for him, he asked for an espresso. Without missing a beat, I countered with "A double shot?" There was the moment of connectivity. These people need shelter from more than just the dark of night. They need shelter to protect them from the stigmas of the uncaring, from the eyes that look at them as strangers. A cold stare and a cold heart can cut deeper than any winter wind. They need the simple shelter of seeing the faces of people who care. Knowing that people will always be there to help them is the greatest shelter and comfort any of us can know. Is that not, in part, why we surround ourselves with icons of the saints? To remind us not only to do the works of the Lord as they did; but to also comfort us, that we may know they care for us too.

Volunteer for the first time if you haven't already. Never mind about not knowing what to do. There will always be more experienced souls to guide you along the path of doing good for others. Don't fear the forest for the trees.

We have an event coming up that we would like to share with you and ask for your help. On June 2, our parish will be celebrating our 39th Anniversary and we are planning a dinner celebration with a Luau theme. (A committee has been formed to help plan our BIG anniversary celebration for next year which will be our 40th Anniversary). This Luau will be the "kick off" for this celebration year leading up to our 40th. If you would like to help with planning the Anniversary activities, you are more than welcome to join this committee. 
