

Justice Corner

Trinity Sunday calls us to be in communion with one another just as the three Persons of the Trinity are in union with one another. This close bond of in-depth sharing is what we are called to be as Church. But human life with all its struggles often separates us and holds us apart from such closeness. The moral outrage that touts, "I am right. I speak for God, and you are wrong," lacks the humility needed to truly do God's work in the world. All good deeds are accomplished through dialogue and listening to one another.

We can begin with Family, often called "the Little Church," because it is where this love and communication operates. We are challenged by our understanding of the Trinity to re-examine our dealing with those closest to us. In the Family we have the main opportunity to resemble the communion that the three Persons in the Trinity provide to us. Jesus reminds us that just as He is in the Father and the Father in Him, He is in us and we are in Him. And that it is the Advocate, the Holy Spirit, who will teach us all things, especially how to show love where none seems to be present.

Into this scene of union, we also place the world as we know it: Families paralyzed by difference, neighbors who don't talk to one another, the political scene full of accusations and spite, countries at war and killing one another. How do we stand for love in the midst of all this strife?

First we <u>acknowledge the Father Creator</u> who gives us Life and challenges us to acknowledge and continue this life. He challenges us to be co-creators with Him, respecting the Earth and all life therein. How are we doing that this week? Do we recycle even though it is an inconvenience? Do we use only what we need and reject the culture of prosperity and extravagance? Have we cleaned our closets and given that which we have not used to the poor?

Then we <u>acknowledge the Son</u> who has redeemed us with His love. Do we accept our crosses joyfully? Do we really know that we are connected to those around us (we in them and they in us) even when we disagree with them? Do we make efforts to bring peace to those who are separated by arguments and high -handedness?

Then we <u>listen to the Spirit</u> in prayer who teaches us all things. The Spirit will help us bring empathy, understanding, patience and graciousness to every situation. Do we take time to bring the things that disturb us to prayer and listen openly to the Spirit's suggestions? Do we try to find the Spirit's movements in the signs of our times? Do we hear the Spirit's urgings even in those we disagree with? No one possesses the complete truth. We need each other to discern God's movement in the world. We need companions for the journey. Is there someone you need to "walk with" this week, someone who needs your support to bear life's burdens? When we do these things, we know that the Spirit of God is working in us and through us to make the world a better place.

The Gospel ends with, "I am with you always, until the end of the age." If we truly know this, we will be at peace in ourselves. We will listen to the Spirit's urgings to respect all life. We will be able to be love in the world and advance the Coming of the Age when Christ will be all in all and we shall be like Him.

GIFT, Knights, & AI

The Thursday morning GIFT (Growing in Faith Together) study group is near mid-way through its video series *The* Kingdom of Happiness, Living the Beatitudes in Daily Life. It has been a very eve-opening study into what is really meant by the terms "poor in spirit," meek, righteous, and so on. The group is encouraged to discuss how these beatitudes are naturally practiced in our daily lives and when we can consciously bring them to the forefront in our dealings with people we meet throughout the day. Each beatitude is treated as a separate lesson and each lesson takes about two weeks to complete. The nice thing about the beatitudes is that each one can be studied without the need for reliance on having seen the previous lesson or the need to see any of them in any particular order. Each beatitude lesson ends with an example of someone who lives a beatitude in an amazing way. This can be in the form of ministry or spiritual conviction or dedication to others. At the end of the series the group will return to its study of the upcoming Sunday scriptures.

Our Knights of Columbus will be having elections of officers this month and so a new, yet experienced crew will lead our valiant Knights in the service of our Church and the community. Just about every event we have here at St. Ignatius of Antioch Church involves the Knights even if it is not a Knight's sponsored event. Every major set-up, tear-down, and clean-up after an event is handled by the Knights; think Fish Fry, St. Joseph Dinner, Christmas Dinner, YLI Pasta Feed, and countless more. The Knights are our First (non-emergency) Responders of the parish. If you see a Knight, thank him for his service.

I received an email from my brother Marc regarding an article of his published in International Sea Systems magazine about ASVs (Autonomous Surface Vehicles). These are like the aerial drones we see and hear about, but for the surface of the seas. From less than 20' to 800' these contain all the sensors needed to avoid collisions with other vessels and perform work tasks along certain routes. Artificial Intelligence (AI) has come a long way but as he points-out at the end of his story, who will perform the daily maintenance? Who will respond to the SOS of a vessel in distress? Who will be there to make the humanitarian decision in the midst of an unforeseen circumstance? Our lives, as Christians, cannot be ASVs. God has never let us drift away into unretrieavable waters. He has redeemed us with the blood of Christ. We are the captains of our lives to the extent that we maintain our life's vessel to do the tasks that God has created us to do. Artificial Intelligence may crop up in every aspect of our modern lives, but the love of God and our love for one another can never be artificial or duplicated by machine.

We have an event coming up that we would like to share with you and ask for your help. On June 2, our parish will be celebrating our 39th Anniversary and we are planning a dinner celebration with a Luau theme. (A committee has been formed to help plan our BIG anniversary celebration for next year which will be our 40th Anniversary). This Luau will be the "kick off" for this celebration year leading up to our 40th. If you would like to help with planning the Anniversary activities, you are more than welcome to join this committee. We are asking for members of each Church Ministry to join in the planning of the Anniversaries. Watch the Bulletin for the next committee meeting.


